



# Stories We Remember



You were the third of five children born to Hedwig and Adolf Gimmi and you lived in an apartment in Zurich where all of you had special chores around the house. Even though you were a somewhat sickly child, you were responsible for helping your mother on wash day. She had no washing machine and it was your job to help her SCRUB dirt off the clothes on a washboard – You remember how cold your little hands used to get! Your childhood was a very happy one and you remember your father being quite strict.





When you graduated from secondary school, (Swiss girls did not study further) your dad bought you a sewing machine and you had your own little business. Your sewing, knitting, bead-mat making and personalized cross stich greeting cards are a legacy we will always treasure.

To this day Michel, Farhad and Adil have the little stuffed toy dogs you made for them when they were babies, the knitted sleeping bags, (Azura got into Farhad's last year in Seattle) and the knitted patch work blankets. I still have the beautiful skirt you crocheted for me. Our home, wherever in the world it has been, was always filled with beautiful things that you gave us over the years. These things remind us of dad, you and our heritage.







A friend of yours in Switzerland asked you to go with her on a blind date to the University Ball. You agreed, and on the 21st Nov 1935 you got all dressed up in this beautiful pink silk dress with silver brocade flowers on it. Your blind date was Dr Amin Mohsin Tyabji, the man who would soon become your husband and change forever your life as you knew it.






When you told your parents you wanted to marry Amin, an Indian PhD student of chemistry at Zurich University, they had to make their enquiries before giving their consent. They contacted the Swiss Consul in Bombay and he sent a letter back to them stating that the Tyabji family was very illustrious, learned and cultured and they should not worry about their daughter marrying into it as she would be well looked after.

You got married on April 18th 1936 in Zurich. At the time, you spoke no English and had not travelled outside of Europe. What tremendous courage you had to leave your beloved family and everything you knew that was dear and familiar to you, and go off to unknown shores with a new husband to make a new life.

You first went to England where dad had a job at Guys Hospital but you didn't like it at all because you found the people cold, rude and racist. You spent a lot of time looking around for a place to stay while dad was at work. Prospective landladies would tell you their flats were available but when you went back with dad in the evening and they saw this "native" man they'd refuse to rent the room to you.

The one joy of being in England was the birth of your first child Ursula. When she was still a baby, you decided to move to India and you were overwhelmed by the wonderful welcome the Tyabji family gave you on your arrival. You enjoyed meeting and interacting with all of them but always held a special place in your heart for Uncle Hussain who, like you, lived to be 100 (1 October 1873 - 20 October 1973.)







Dad was an only child and had lost his father Mohsin who drowned on a family outing in Kihim while he was trying to save two young children swimming out at sea. Amin was 15 when this happened and consequently his mother Tahira was very protective of him. When you arrived in Bombay you had to stay with your mother-in-law in her apartment in Chowpatty. You were barely able to communicate with each other and she took care of the day to day running of the house.

What a difficult situation that must have been and how well you managed it! You told us of the shock you got when you first went to the Crawford Market many months after you first arrived in India. You were surprised and thrilled when you saw piles of fresh vegetables and TOMATOES! You thought they did not grow in India as granny never served them and you had missed them so much!


Robert was born in 1943 in the apartment building where you first lived and which was owned by Granny. Coincidently she rented a space in it to the well known portrait painter Mr. J A Lalkaka who had his studio there.

Could you ever have predicted that 28 years later your son Robert would marry his granddaughter Hootoksi?

From the apartment you moved to a beautiful bungalow with a large garden in Breach Candy, and Granny moved in with you but she had her own wing.



You had many happy times there and over the years you became fully involved in activities with the Red Cross, The Scots Kirk and St John's Ambulance to mention but a few.



Among your large circle of friends you had many Swiss and you'd often have tea parties in the garden. While you sat there nibbling sandwiches Robert remembers the kites swooping down and flying off with a sandwich from the hands of an unsuspecting guest! He also remembers putting out little saucers of milk in the garden for the cobras to come and feast on at night. And he remembers Jessica the black Labrador who would catch any cat who strayed into the compound, toss it in the air and break its neck!



In 2009 we were in Bombay celebrating with Robert's class of 1959, 50 years after they graduated from High School. He met two teachers who remembered him well, and all his classmates most of whom he had not seen in all these years! Several of them remembered playing cops and robbers in the garden of Somerset Cottage, and one of them told me he still remembers you because he did not have a holster for his gun and you made him one!

# ALICE TYABJ

Gracious, unassuming, simply dressed Mrs. Tyabji has more in her than meets the eye. Behind that pleasant face and those twinkling eyes, is a living force that enables her to take brave decisions and strong, sensible measures.

Alice Tyabji is the founder member of the Women's Home Industry department run by the Maharashtra State Women's Council. An active member of the Red Cross during the strife-torn warr years, Alice still helps — working for the St. John's Ambulance Division. She is also closely connected with the Scottish Women's Guild.

Alice Tyabji feels that small units draw more talent and achieve better ends, than big groups. True to her conviction, she proudly heads a mini organisation of twelve women. The ladies are right now busy preparing for their annual sale, scheduled for early November. The funds collected are earmarked for the Victoria Memorial School for the Blind. 

In all the years that you were separated from your family in Switzerland you never forgot them or stayed away too long. You travelled regularly to see them and spent many happy summers working in your friend's Souvenir shop in Interlaken where you could speak in English to the many tourists who came in to buy the beautiful Swiss handicrafts.











Much as you had enjoyed your life in India, you knew the time was ripe to make preparations for your old age so you took the plunge to relocate to Australia to be close to Ursula. Once again you had to make huge adjustments to your life, make new friends while taking care of dad whose heart always remained in Bombay. As he aged and needed nursing, you had to make the difficult decision of moving him into a nursing home and we will never forget the devotion with which you loved and cared for him there till the end of his days.

Then years later, long after dad had passed on, you made the decision to move into the Dogherty Apartments, a retirement village in Sydney, because you did not want to be a burden to anybody in your twilight years. So once again you demonstrated your selfless and independent nature to us.




































































### Famous People Born 1911

Alice Gimmi-Tyabji – Born on 5th September 1911 to Hedwig and Adolf Gimmi in Zurich, Switzerland. Best mother, mother-in-law, grand mother, great grandmother, friend and aunt spanning the continents of Europe, Asia and Australia. Famous for her *saur braten*, *gugelhupf*, bead mats, knitting, crochet, cross stich and sewing and recipient of various awards. She was unanimously voted "Best Female Human on the Planet" by the Tyabji–Gimmi families on 5th September 2011.

Maharishi Mahesh Yogi – the Indian Yogi who founded the Transcendental Meditation Movement.

Naguib Mahfouz – Egyptian Novelist and winner of the 1988 Nobel Prize for Literature.

Mahalia Jackson – Gospel singer deeply committed to the civil-rights movement, she was closely associated with the work of Dr Martin Luther King.

Josef Mengele – born in Germany and was the dreaded famous doctor known as the angel of death during Hitler's regime.

Ronald Wilson Reagan – born in Illinois, he was the 40th US President

Ginger Rogers – American film and stage actress, dancer and singer. She was Fred Astair's dance partner.

Tunku Abdul Rahman – founding father and first Prime Minister of Independent Malaysia.

Juan Manuel Fangio – Racing car driver from Argentina who dominated the first decade of Formula One racing.

Ali Solomone Aga Khan – The religious leader and international playboy.

Tennessee Williams - Playwright.

E F Schumacher – German Economist.

**Sep 17th -** First transcontinental airplane flight, NY-Pasadena in 82 hrs 4 min.

Sep 29th - Italy declares war on Turkey, starting the Italo-Turkish War.

Oct 4th - First public elevator (London's Earl's Court Metro Station).

Oct 6th - Beatrix van Rijk becomes first licensed Dutch woman pilot.

**Oct 10th -** Sun Yat-sen's revolutionaries overthrow Manchus (Taiwan National Day).

**Oct 24th -** Orville Wright remained in the air 9 minutes and 45 seconds in a glider at Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina setting a new world record that stood for 10 years.

Nov 4th - France and Germany sign treaty about Morocco & Congo.

**Nov 5th -** Italy attacks Turkish North-Africa (Libya), takes Tipoli & Cyrenaica.

**Nov 10th -** Imperial army recaptures Nanking (blood bath)

**Nov 19th -** New York receives the first Marconi wireless transmission from Italy.

**Dec 12th** – The Delhi Durbar is held, formally announcing the coronation of King George V and his assumption of the title Emperor of India.

**Dec 12th -** Delhi replaces Calcutta as the capital of India.

**Dec 1911 -** The Gateway of India was built to commemorate the visit of King George V and Queen Mary to Bombay.

Dec 14th - South Pole first reached, by Norwegian Roald Amundsen.

**Dec 27th –** The Jana Gana Mana, which would become free India's National Anthem is sung for the first time at the Indian National Congress annual convention in Calcutta.

Dec 29th - Sun Yat-sen becomes the first President of the Republic of China.

Dec 29th - Mongolia gains independence from the Qing dynasty.

Dec 31st - Marie Curie receives her second Nobel Prize.

#### Did You Know?

**Charles de Jaeger** was born in Vienna in 1911. He worked in Austria as a freelance photographer before moving to Britain during the 1930s where he worked for the film unit of General Charles de Gaulle's Free French Forces. He joined the BBC in 1943.

De Jaeger had a reputation for being a practical joker. One time he had to buy some dungarees to protect his clothes during an assignment. He requested compensation from the BBC but was denied. The administration told him that he should have worn old clothes. A month later de Jaeger submitted an expense report in which he included £6, spent on "entertaining press officer, Mr Dungarees." De Jaeger noted, "They paid without a murmur."

#### The Swiss Spaghetti Harvest

On April 1, 1957 the British news show *Panorama* broadcast a three-minute segment about a bumper spaghetti harvest in southern Switzerland. The success of the crop was attributed both to an unusually mild winter and to the "virtual disappearance of the spaghetti weevil." The audience heard Richard Dimbleby, the show's highly respected anchor, discussing the details of the spaghetti crop as they watched video footage of a Swiss family pulling pasta off spaghetti trees and placing it into baskets. The segment concluded with the assurance that, "For those who love this dish, there's nothing like real, home-grown spaghetti."

The Swiss Spaghetti Harvest hoax generated an enormous response. Hundreds of people phoned the BBC wanting to know how they could grow their own spaghetti tree. To this query the BBC diplomatically replied, "Place a sprig of spaghetti in a tin of tomato sauce and hope for the best."

To this day the *Panorama* broadcast remains one of the most famous and popular April Fool's Day hoaxes of all time. It is also believed to be the first time the medium of television was used to stage an April Fool's Day hoax.

The person who came up with the idea of the spaghetti harvest hoax was *Panorama* cameraman Charles de Jaeger.

The idea for the spaghetti harvest hoax grew out of a remark one of his Viennese school teachers often teasingly said to his class: "Boys, you're so stupid, you'd believe me if I told you that spaghetti grows on trees." As an adult, it occurred to de Jaeger that it would be funny to turn this remark into a visual joke for April Fool's Day. He became quite obsessed with the idea, trying a number of times to sell the idea to different bosses. But it was only in 1957 while he was working for *Panorama* that he found some willing accomplices.

Switzerland produced an **embroidered** stamp in 2000, celebrating the world-famous embroidery created in St. Gallen, one of the Swiss cantons.



The multi-coloured Swiss Guards who protect the Pope in the Vatican City must be single, Catholic, males aged between 19 and 30 and at least 5ft 9in tall with Swiss citizenship. Their official language is German. (The Telegraph 2008)

Films were made in Switzerland only after 1924, before which only foreign films were shown.


My darling Dadima,
