TALE of Bhutan," a documentary in colour, jointly made by UNICEF and the Royal Bhutan Government, was previewed here on May 26. One of the first films of its kind to be shot on locations in the kingdom, the film depicts Bhutan's determination to develop and provide social services, while preserving its distinct identity. the film has been directed by Robert Tyabli from a story and script by Hootokishi Tyabji. The director said that two versions - in English with a running time of 27 minutes, and in Bhutanese, with a running time of 37 minutes had been made.

The budget had come to Rs. 35takhs and the film would be released by UNICEF throughout the world, through the television networks, through the various regional offices of UNICEF and also through schools in Western countries as developmental educational ma-
